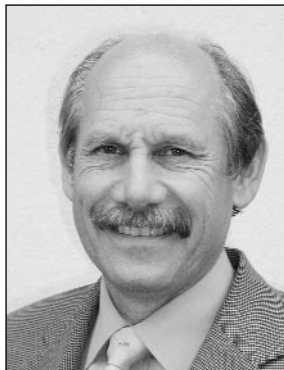

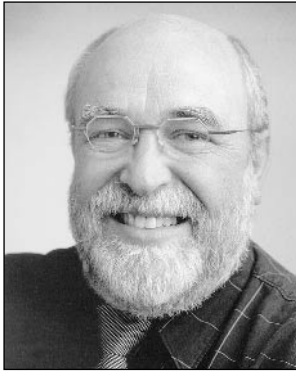

Erfurt – City of Culture and Sport



Erfurt is not only the capital of the Freistaat Thüringen (Free State of Thuringia) but with nearly 200,000 inhabitants and an area of approx. 269 km² it is also its biggest city. You can decide for yourself after your visit to the “Green Heart of Germany” whether it is the most beautiful one as well.

Erfurt was first mentioned in 742 A. D. and has grown in the middle ages from being an important intersection of the old trading routes to become a powerful centre of the trading industries. And an important university was founded too. Erfurt’s cultural, intellectual and economic strengths brought great personalities such as Martin Luther (Augustinian monastery), Adam Ries, Goethe, Schiller, Herder, Wieland, Bach (Kaufmannskirche, the church where J. S. Bach’s

parents were married), W. v. Humboldt, Zsar Alexander and Napoléon (Kaisersaal, Staatskanzlei).

The former wealth of the city may be witnessed in the many carefully restored renaissance and half-timbered houses which, with many other buildings and the Krämerbrücke make up one of the best preserved historical city centres of medieval times in Germany. At one time the 36 parish churches and chapels as well as 15 monasteries and ecclesiastical foundations were responsible for Erfurt having been given the nicknames “Rome of Thuringia” and “erfordia turrita” (tower crowned Erfurt).

Erfurt’s landmark is the unique ensemble of both, the Mariendom (cathedral of Mary) and the Severikirche (St. Severus church) which



majestically dominates the cityscape. This architectural masterpiece of German gothic style is an imposing example of the art of church architecture. Around the Cathedral Square are many historical buildings which have survived the artillery attack of 1813 and numerous city fires.

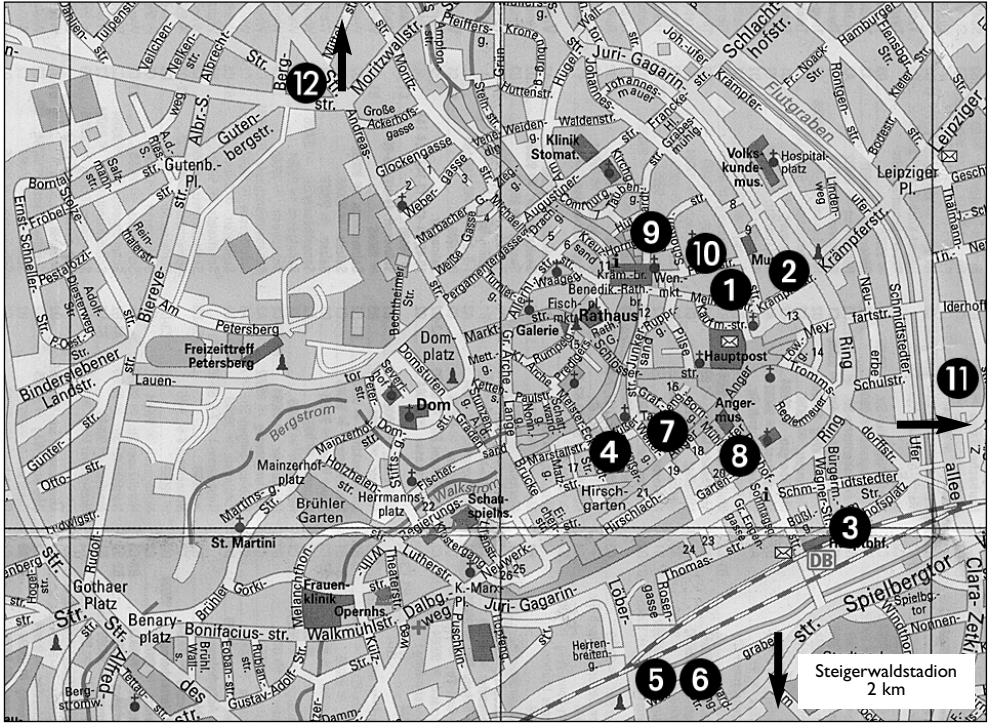
The Krämerbrücke is Erfurt's most interesting piece of secular architecture. The stone arched bridge was constructed in 1325 over the Gera river ford, built through and following the trading route of the via regia. The Krämerbrücke is the only bridge north of the Alps to be entirely covered with buildings that are still used as residences.

Today the capital city of Thuringia is an attractive and vital centre of this state that continues to offer a rich and active intellectual and cultural life. Parks and large areas of green space also invite to relax. The city is characterised by around 550 hectares of green, almost 2,000 hectares of forest, 379 hectares of water and 156 kilometres of river.

Erfurt stands also for success in sport. Especially the track & field athletes, swimmers and cyclists caused world-wide sensation. Today top athletes take up this tradition and return with titles and medals from the arenas of the world to the capital of Thuringia. Modern sports facilities such as the Steigerwaldstadion, the athletics and ice sport centres, the Olympic training centre and the regional high performance centre for athletics, cycling, swimming and ice sports as well as the sports high school offer talented young athletes ideal development possibilities and excellent training and competition opportunities. With the brand new tartan track which is currently being laid out in the Steigerwaldstadion, Erfurt distinguishes itself further as a centre of national and European athletics and convinces with a sports enthusiastic and fair audience.

Transport and Arrival

We recommend the teams to use the above flight possibilities or to organise their own charter flights to Erfurt. In addition, the LOC is trying to organise additional charter flights from Berlin and Frankfurt to Erfurt on the main arrival/departure days. Further details including cost of the flights, flight schedule etc will be communicated as soon as possible.

Erfurt, the capital of Thuringia, is located between Frankfurt/Main and Leipzig and can be reached by airplane, car and train.

By air

Erfurt has an International Airport, just 5 km and a fifteen minute drive from the city centre. For more information about the airport and an overview of the daily flight connections please visit: www.airport-erfurt.de

The airport connects the city with the following direct destinations:

By rail

Erfurt is an important rail junction in the centre of Germany, located at one of the major rail tracks: Frankfurt/M. – Erfurt – Halle/Leipzig – Berlin – Warsaw – Moscow.

All trains stop, respectively start/end at Erfurt Hauptbahnhof (main train station), located directly on the edge of the old city centre.

By road

Erfurt can easily be reached by car on the motorways A4 (Eisenach–Dresden) and A71 and via the north-south link on the motorway A9 (Berlin–Munich).

The distances from Erfurt to other major German cities are:

Frankfurt – Erfurt	190 km
Berlin – Erfurt	240 km
Leipzig – Erfurt	100 km
Munich – Erfurt	320 km

For organisational reasons all federations shall inform the LOC about their travel plans (means of transportation, airport of destination, arrival/ departure date) already with their preliminary entries. Hotel transfers will not be provided from any other airport than Erfurt.

Steigerwaldstadion – Facts and Figures



Today's Steigerwaldstadion was officially opened on 17 May 1931 after a construction period of 4 years. At this time an approximately 8 m wide grass track for horse racing was situated between the 500 m running track and the field. Only in 1934 a wooden tribune was built. This tribune, exposed to the elements, was restored several times but lasted almost 60 years.

In the 50s the soccer team of SV Turbine Erfurt and track and field athletes like Herrmann, Richtzenhein and Matuschewski trained and successfully performed in the stadium. In the 60s the Steigerwaldstadion hosted many important athletics events such as Olympic trials and matches. By the end of the 60s the arena received a modern 400 m synthetic track.

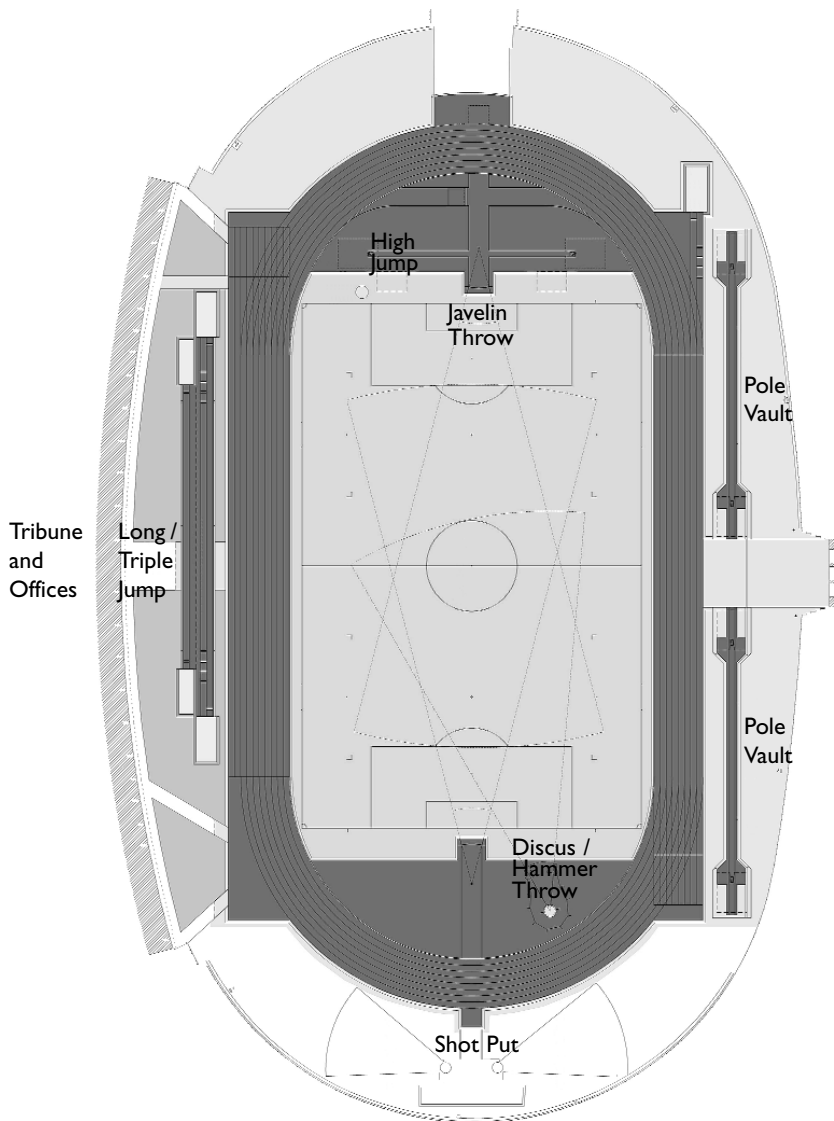
In 1994 the new tribune was inaugurated offering now also considerably improved conditions to the spectators of top class events. In 1994 and 1999 the German Championships and in 1996 the National Junior Championships in Athletics were held in the stadium.

Immediately after the DLV Athletics Meeting on 13 June 2004 another modification of the Steigerwaldstadion started. Sprinkler installations for the field will be added and the 400 m running track will receive a new surface.

Adjacent installations such as the athletic indoor hall with fitness and physiotherapy rooms, additional sports grounds and a park provide excellent training conditions and warm-up areas for the preparation of the athletes.

The total capacity of the stadium is 20,000 spectators. Covered Seats: 4,000 - Uncovered Seats: 2,000 - Standing Capacity: 14,000

■ Competitors must comply with the following conditions of age: Only those whose 20th (twentieth), 21st (twenty first) or 22nd (twenty second) birthday occurs in the year of the competition are eligible to compete.

Competitors must be able to present, if requested to do so by the Technical Delegates, an official document stating their birth date.

■ A maximum of 3 (three) athletes entered by any one EAA Member may compete provided that each athlete has reached the qualifying standard so far set for that event. Provided that any EAA Member enters only 1 (one) athlete for any event, such an athlete shall not be required to have reached the qualifying standard for that event.

■ Qualifying standards must be achieved in bona fide competition (either indoors or outdoors) between the 1st January 2004 and the closing date for final entries (5 July 2005).

■ 2 (two), 3 (three) or 4 (four) athletes can initially be entered per event provided all have achieved the entry standard for that event.

ENTRY DEADLINES

According to the EAA Regulations the following entry deadlines apply for the European U'23 Championships:

Preliminary Entries: 14 March 2005
Final Entries: 05 July 2005

Entries shall be made through the EAA online entry system.
